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# WHITNEY MUSEUM IS FREE TO VISITORS OF ALL AGES SUNDAY, FEBRUARY 11 WITH ARTMAKING PROGRAMS LED BY ARTIST DYANI WHITE HAWK



Before the big game, families can explore the Whitney as part of Free Second Sundays, with artmaking programs led by artist Dyani White Hawk, a tour of the brand new exhibition Harold Cohen: AARON, and more!

**New York, NY, February 5, 2024** — The Whitney Museum is offering free admission all day on **Sunday, February 11** and **special programming in English and Spanish** for visitors of **all ages.** The Whitney is the perfect spot to gather with friends and family as New Yorkers are looking for things to do to celebrate Valentine's Day or before the Super Bowl!

The February installment of this monthly program will offer all-ages artmaking activities led by artist Dyani White Hawk, exhibition tours, and in-gallery discussions, including a closer look at *Harold Cohen: AARON* and *Natalie Ball: bilwi naats Ga'niipci,* among other programs. The program and another new initiative, Free Friday Nights, both aim to reduce barriers to access, removing admission fees and offering programs that are entry points for anyone interested in visiting. Over the decades the AARON software has created images meant to be executed by drawing and painting devices. This exhibition features AARON works, and also highlights the software as the central creative force behind them through screen-based versions of the program and drawings made by plotters operating live in the gallery.

#### About Free Friday Nights and Second Sundays

The Whitney's Second Sundays program marks a significant expansion of the Whitney's already robust suite of <u>free and discounted offerings</u>. By offering free admission and special programming, the initiative aims to reduce barriers to the Whitney, offer audiences a welcoming entry point, and further the Museum's mission of celebrating contemporary American art and artists.

Second Sundays are made possible by a three-year grant from the Art Bridges Foundation's Access for All program, which supports increased access to museums across the country and fosters engagement with local communities by reducing common barriers to access.

In addition to Second Sundays, the Museum also launched Free Friday Nights on January 12, with free admission from 5–10 pm every Friday. The evenings will also offer music and special programming. The Whitney's Free Friday Nights are an ideal destination for happy hours and date nights and will play a larger role in the evening energy of the Meatpacking District.

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## **ABOUT THE WHITNEY**

The Whitney Museum of American Art, founded in 1930 by the artist and philanthropist Gertrude Vanderbilt Whitney (1875–1942), houses the foremost collection of American art from the twentieth and twenty-first centuries. Mrs. Whitney, an early and ardent supporter of modern American art, nurtured groundbreaking artists when audiences were still largely preoccupied with the Old Masters. From her vision arose the Whitney Museum of American Art, which has been a champion of the most innovative art and artists in the United States for over ninety years. At its core, the Whitney's mission is to collect, preserve, interpret, and exhibit American art of our time and serve a wide variety of audiences in celebration of the complexity and diversity of art and culture in the United States. Through this mission and a steadfast commitment to artists, the Whitney has long been a powerful force supporting modern and contemporary art. The Museum helps to define what is innovative and influential in American art today.

#### Whitney Museum Land Acknowledgment

The Whitney is located in Lenapehoking, the ancestral homeland of the Lenape. The name Manhattan comes from their word Mannahatta, meaning "island of many hills." The Museum's current site is close to land that was a Lenape fishing and planting site called Sapponckanikan ("tobacco field"). The Whitney acknowledges the displacement of this region's original inhabitants and the Lenape diaspora that exists today.

As a museum of American art in a city with vital and diverse communities of Indigenous people, the Whitney recognizes the historical exclusion of Indigenous artists from its collection and program. The Museum is committed to addressing these erasures and honoring the perspectives of Indigenous artists and communities as we work for a more equitable future. Visitors eighteen years and under and Whitney members: FREE.
